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# About LTPD

In September 2004, the City of Lone Tree established the Lone Tree Police Department (LTPD). Through the extraordinary work of the first Chief of Police and Lieutenant, LTPD was established in 90 days and originally consisted of 22 sworn officers and two civilian employees. This original team took on the monumental task of developing policies, purchasing all necessary equipment and vehicles, and hiring the necessary staff to provide the high level of police services expected by our citizens.

LTPD currently has 53 sworn officers, 12 civilian employees and 22 volunteers serving the community. The staff has grown alongside the City, which expanded after the annexation of Park Meadows Retail Resort in 2006.

The Department provides public safety through our commitment to community policing and our strong regional collaborations with Douglas County Sheriff's Office and the Parker Police Department.

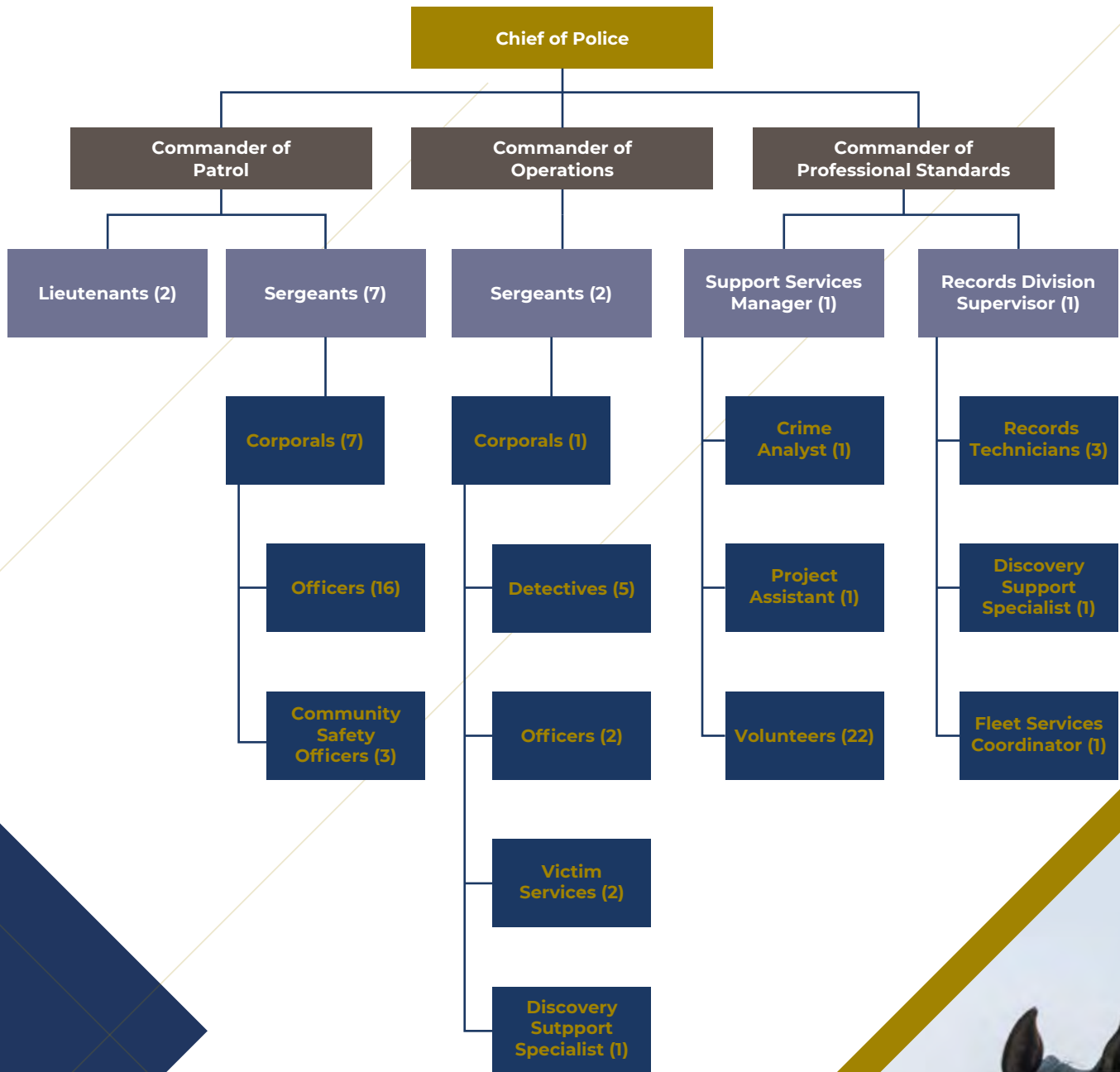
## TEACH Model

# Investigations

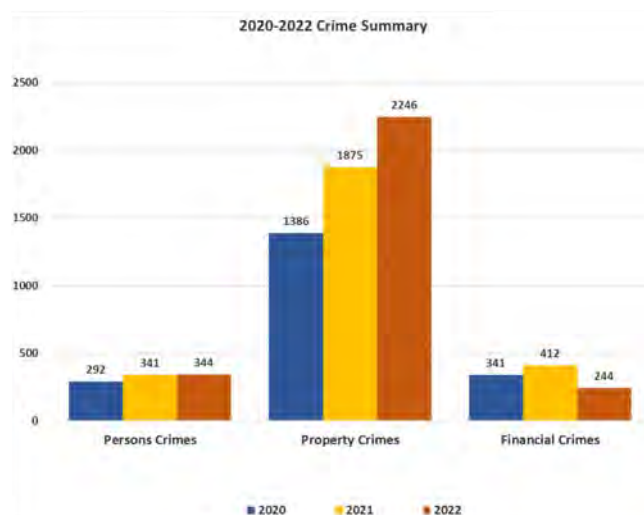

2022 was a very busy year for the Investigations Unit. The team was called out to scenes after hours more than ever in the Department's history, 31 times for a total of 311 hours. This did not include times where detectives assisted patrol during normal business hours. It was Sgt. VanDenBerg's last year in the unit as he was promoted to Lieutenant and moved to Patrol on January 1, 2023. We worked with the Parker / Lone Tree evidence team and purged hundreds of items of property. The investigations unit was also very busy conducting background investigations for the newly hired police officers.

# Investigations 2022 Highlights

- ▶ On April 11, 2022, Michelle Wingrove left the LTPD Records Unit and became the department's first ever Discovery Specialist. Michelle is responsible for getting all felony case filing documents, information, and other associated paperwork loaded into the E-Discovery program for the Douglas County DA's Office.
- ▶ On September 29, 2022, the Lone Tree Police Department Investigative Unit was called out to the parking lot of Word of Life Church. Patrol had located an adult male and an adult female with gunshot wounds. Both parties were transported to Sky Ridge Hospital where the male died. Detectives learned the female was the mother of the male. She had sent several suicidal messages to family and friends, then randomly stopped in the parking lot where she shot her special needs adult son twice, and then attempted to kill herself. She survived her own gunshot and is awaiting trial for 1st Degree Murder.
- ▶ On October 23, 2022, the LTPD Investigations Unit responded to the intersection of Lincoln Avenue at Park Meadows Drive for a fatal hit-n-run accident. Video footage of the intersection shows a male party in a pickup truck ran a red light while traveling at an excessive speed. He t-boned a small sedan occupied by a young female who was a CNA at Sky Ridge Medical Center and was on her way to work. She did not survive the crash. Detectives worked with the County-wide IMPACT team to positively identify and contact the driver. He eventually turned himself and is awaiting vehicular homicide and other charges.
- ▶ The Unit was successful in applying for two Extreme Risk Protection Orders (ERPO) in 2022. The Lone Tree Police Department continues to pursue these orders when appropriate and it has been able to use this tool to help keep the community safe.
- ▶ The Unit experienced some staffing issues, so the IMPACT assigned detective was recalled in August. We also lost the FIRST detective mid-year and did not replace that position with a detective until January 1, 2023.
- ▶ 2022 was a busy year for the Investigations Unit. Detectives were called out 31 times over the year. Detectives were assigned over 1000 cases. Detectives completed 195 case filings and applied for 141 warrants.





# Crime Scene / Evidence

- ▶ The Property and Evidence Section is operated by an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with the Town of Parker. The section is responsible for the security and accountability of all property and evidence collected at crime scenes by Parker and Lone Tree police personnel. Between the two agencies, a total of 5,362 items were submitted in 2022 (a 25% increase from 2021). Currently, approximately 66,000 items are stored. Staff is not only tasked with the safe storage of the property and evidence, but its final disposition or disposal as well. Prior to any items reaching final disposition, a thorough case review process is closely followed per department guidelines, state statutes, and in coordination with the District Attorney's office. A total of 1,824 items were purged in 2022.
- ▶ Lone Tree property and evidence intake accounted for 58.2% of all items submitted to the Property and Evidence Section in 2022.
- ▶ Total Lone Tree Items Submitted: 3,126 \*This is 32% increase over last year.
- ▶ The Crime Scene Unit has three full-time civilian crime scene investigators who respond to a variety of crimes throughout Parker and Lone Tree and assist the 18th Judicial District's Critical Incident Response Team. The Crime Scene Unit is managed by a civilian crime scene and evidence manager who is also a certified senior crime scene analyst. Their primary responsibilities are to investigate crimes by carefully documenting, collecting and analyzing evidence. They may collect clothing, latent prints, hair, fibers, and bodily fluids from scenes, victims and suspects. They may also perform tests (in the field or in a forensic laboratory) on items located at crime scenes. Crime Scene Investigators are an integral part of the investigative process and often work closely with detectives. The Crime Scene Unit responds to calls for service during off-duty hours to ensure 24-7/365 days of service. The Crime Scene Unit responded to Lone Tree for 36 investigations in 2022. This is FIVE more than 2021
- ▶ CSI responses to Lone Tree Crime Scenes: 36. 17 of the call outs were during work hours. The other 19 were call outs during evening, nights, and weekends when the team had to be called in to respond.

# Crime Scene / Evidence

## Noteworthy:

- ▶ The 2022 Annual Audit was conducted on 4,485 items. There were zero items missing, and only a handful of discrepancies found.
- ▶ Purging efforts reconvened in August of 2022. A total of 1,824 items were purged. 848 were Parker items and 976 were Lone Tree items.
- ▶ Another major highlight was the addition of Crime Scene Investigator II Vanessa Hohreiter who joined us in August of 2022. Vanessa was the third Crime Scene Investigator within the Evidence Section to have earned her Federal Aviation Administration sUAS Part 107 Drone Pilot's License, next to Nathalie Klasens and one other CSI.
- ▶ The new FARO LASER Scanner that was acquired for the CSI and Crash Teams last year was used for the fatal Hit-N-Run crash in Lone Tree in October. It proved to be a great tool

Evidence is housed by Parker Police Department through an Intergovernmental Agreement. Staff works hard to keep all evidence organized and tracked for returning to Individuals or for destruction in compliance with retention schedules.

# Community Partnership Unit

The Community Partnership Unit (CPU) continues to work hard to build relationships with area residents, school, and business partners, providing education and encouraging safe practices.

In the Spring of 2022, we continued our open community outreach events, including Coffee with a Cop. We were also able to bring back the police departments open house with displays from SWAT, South Metro Fire, Colorado State Patrol, Command vehicle, Evidence, Dispatch, the VIPS, to name a few. The event was free and well attended by area residents.

In order to enhance our community outreach, the Community Partnership Unit has begun doing an initial greeting of all new startup business that come into the city. This allows us to meet the new owners and pass along crime prevention material they can train their new employees on. CPU officers have also started attending a majority of the special events the city hosts, in hopes of reaching out to the children and area residents. Look for us during next year's Backyard Beats Concerts, the Independence Day celebration, Fall Festival, and Merry Days.

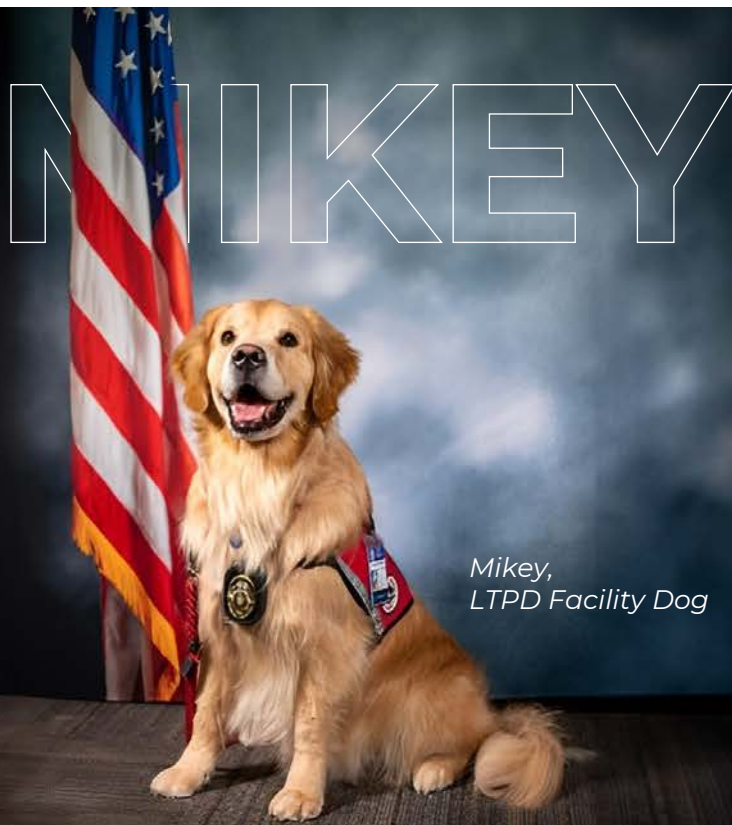
# Victim Services & Facility Dog



## Victim Services

The Lone Tree Police Department Victim Assistance Unit (VAU) is culturally responsive in meeting the needs of the community through direct services and resources to victims of crime and other critical incidents that could result in trauma. Short term crisis intervention and support services are based on need and delivered without discrimination of age, race, gender, or religion. The objective of the VAU is to ensure victims are aware of their rights and resources while ensuring that the department meets the requirements of law enforcement as specified in the Colorado Constitutional Victim Rights Amendment Act.

The VAU at the Lone Tree Police Department is available 24 hours, 7 days a week. The program relies heavily on volunteer staff that donate their personal time to serve the Lone Tree community. Volunteers are on call after hours, on weekends and holidays. A large part of the program's success is because of the countless hours that volunteers donate. The VAU actively recruits all year. 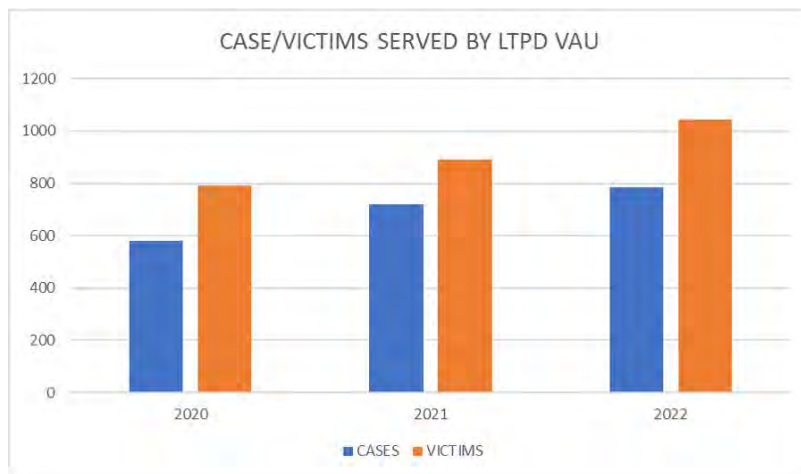

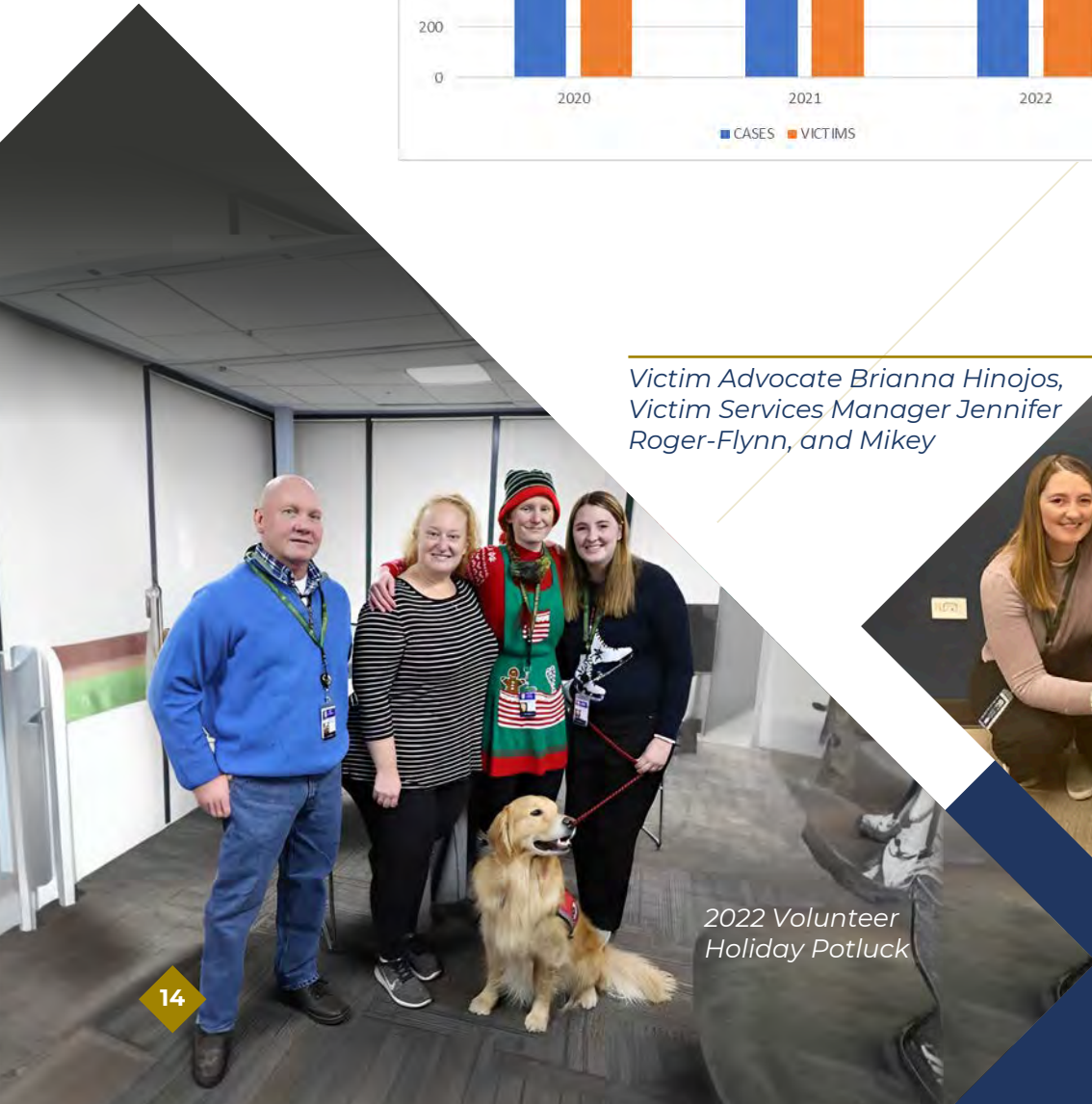
# Victim Services Unit

## Statistics

In 2022, the VAU worked 784 cases and served 1043 individuals. That is a 17% increase of individuals served from 2021. Collected data from the VAU case management system illustrates that most victims served in the city are non-residents and are more likely to be a part of the influx of individuals that work or visit the city daily. Of those served in 2022, 40% lived in the city and approximately 60% were non-residents. Those numbers are consistent with data collected in 2021.

# Patrol Division

Commander Beals has been with the Lone Tree Police Department for over 17 years and has served as a patrol officer, detective and was promoted to Sergeant in 2011. Commander Beals was promoted to his current position in 2019. As a Sergeant he supervised in patrol, Community Partnership Unit, and in Professional Standards. Commander Beals earned his Bachelor's Degree in Psychology from Regis University in Denver and is also a 2012 graduate of the Northwestern Police Command School.

In October of 2022 Brett Callahan was promoted to Division Commander over Patrol. Commander Callahan has 28 years of experience as a police officer, and has been with the Lone Tree Police Department for 18 years. Previous to Lone Tree, he worked for Weld County Sheriff's Department, and Erie Police Department. Over his 28-year career, Commander Callahan has worked all types of assignments, Patrol, Detective, SWAT Operator, and Narcotics Detective. In 2004 Commander Callahan was one of the first officers hired by the newly formed Lone Tree Police Department as the Investigations Sergeant. In 2020 he was promoted to Lieutenant. Commander Callahan holds a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from CSU, and in 2008 Graduated from Northwestern University Police staff and Command.

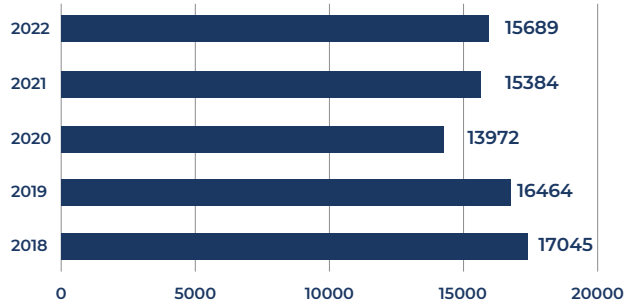

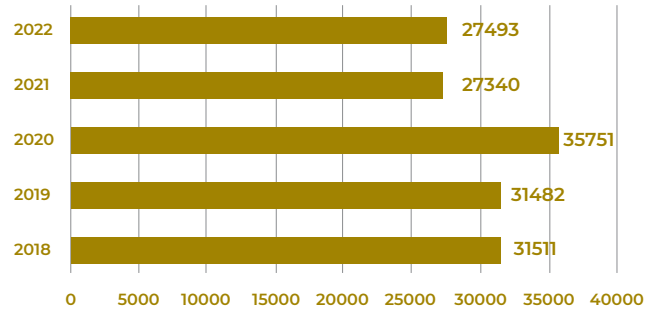

# Community Safety Officers

LTPD started the Community Safety Officers (CSO) unit in 2018 to help sworn officers by handling service calls for cold theft and private property accidents, among other similar calls. The unit has proven to be a huge asset to the department with over 6,500 calls for service in 2022.

Additional Duties/Tasks completed by CSOs:

- ▶ Provided additional coverage at City Council meetings to free up officers/commanders that had attended previously.
- ▶ Completed the Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) certification and are now able to carry pepper spray for their protection.
- ▶ Trained and took over animal control responsibilities.
- ▶ Along with Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS), have taken over the responsibilities of shuttling vehicles for service.
- ▶ CSO Gunderson and CSO Olivas attended the Field Training Evaluation Program (FTEP) training course and are now certified to train new CSOs coming to the department.
- ▶ Handled Animal Control calls for service as needed

# Partnerships through IGAs

In June 2005, LTPD entered into an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with the Town of Parker to receive dispatch services through Parker PD's dispatchers. As a new department, the cost of establishing a dispatch center strictly for LTPD was not only demanding on staffing, but also time consuming and expensive. Both municipalities agreed on partnering on dispatch services and has since been renewed multiple times. Today, it remains a strong partnership with state-of-the-art technology to protect the community through Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD).

Other IGAs with the Town of Parker include fleet services, maintaining more than 60 vehicles, evidence and crime scene investigations. The evidence and crime scene services are used on an as needed basis. Staff is on-call to assist our department when needed.

IGAs or Memos of Understanding (MOUs) with other agencies have also resulted in the following partnerships :

- ▶ A SWAT team comprised of members of all county law enforcements agencies collaborating to form a strong regional SWAT team to provide specialized services on high-risk incidents
- ▶ South Metro Area Response Truck (SMART) command post that is mobile and accessible to all Douglas County law enforcement agencies
- ▶ A School Marshal Program that provides officers at two local elementary schools with the Douglas County School District
- ▶ Emergency Vehicle Operations Course (EVOC) which allows use of specialized drive track for perishable skills training to law enforcement
- ▶ SOTAR, a sex offenders program set up by Douglas County Sheriff's Office to provide a database to track sex offenders throughout the state
- ▶ Parker Towing, preferred vendor for all police tows
- ▶ Rocky Mountain Information Network which specializes in investigations throughout the Rocky Mountain region
- ▶ Douglas County Health Services (DCHS) agreement for both child and adult protection services
- ▶ Douglas County joint animal sheltering IGA that provides services through the Buddy Center to house stray animals picked up in Lone Tree
- ▶ Rocky Mountain Computer Forensic Lab allows digital evidence and related items to be analyzed



# Professional Standards Division

The Professional Standards Division, led by Commander Ron Pinson, is responsible for Support Services, Records Unit, Crime Analysis, department hiring and processing of citizen and internal complaints. The mission of the division is to ensure staff has the resources needed to function appropriately regardless of external forces, promptly and thoroughly investigate complaints, identify department needs, and design programs to meet those needs.

Support Services also coordinates the Volunteer Program which has 22 volunteers. Other duties include notification of towed vehicles, budgeting, administering the Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST) portal, and conducting awards and recognition programs for the department.

## Crime Analysis Unit

This unit is staffed by Crime Analyst Kristi Brotherton. She provides statistical data to a variety of departments throughout the agency including a monthly patrol statistics report, a monthly call for service report, and weekly reports for calls for service at 10 apartment complexes and nine hotels.

In 2022, she created and disseminated 338 crime bulletins. She also works closely with investigations by tracking suspects that appear in numerous bulletins to provide them with valuable information in connecting suspects to criminal activity throughout the front range.

# Records Division

## Records Supervisor

Staffed by Records Supervisor, Stephanie Zingg, the division consists of three records technicians: Jenni Davies, Pete Peterson, Jeanie Zamora, and one Police Services Coordinator, Dennis Page. They are the first point of contact when you enter the police department. They ensure accuracy of records and dissemination to other agencies and the public including body worn camera video and photos. They are also responsible for all state and federal (NIBR's and Use of Force and Officer Contacts) reporting.

## In 2022 the Division:

- ▶ Processed 4,018 (+ 217) case reports
- ▶ Sent 533 (+112) traffic accidents to Department of Revenue, Carfax, Douglas County
- ▶ Processed 3351 (+1366) citations
- ▶ Sealed, expunged 246 (+153) sealed / expunged records
- ▶ Completed 694 (+181) records requests and 50 (+15) public Evidence.com requests
- ▶ Shared 729 (+219) police and background reports and with other law enforcement agencies, including Human Services
- ▶ Completed 122 (+82) Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) requests

# Volunteers in Police Service

LTPD's Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) program was established in 2007 to promote effective use of the many citizens who wished to donate their time and talents to further the goals of the Department. The VIPS' mission is to serve as a support service to LTPD by enhancing the effectiveness of community policing through the provision of administrative and support services.

The VIPS program offers a variety of opportunities for citizens to get involved with the Department. In 2022, volunteers contributed **8,040.50 volunteer hours**, which equates to a **\$253,356** value to the city. Each August we celebrate their contributions with our annual Volunteer Appreciation Picnic.

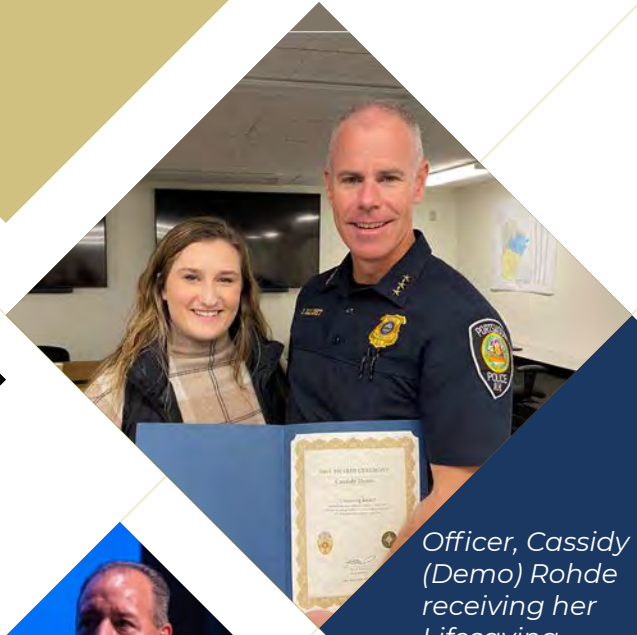

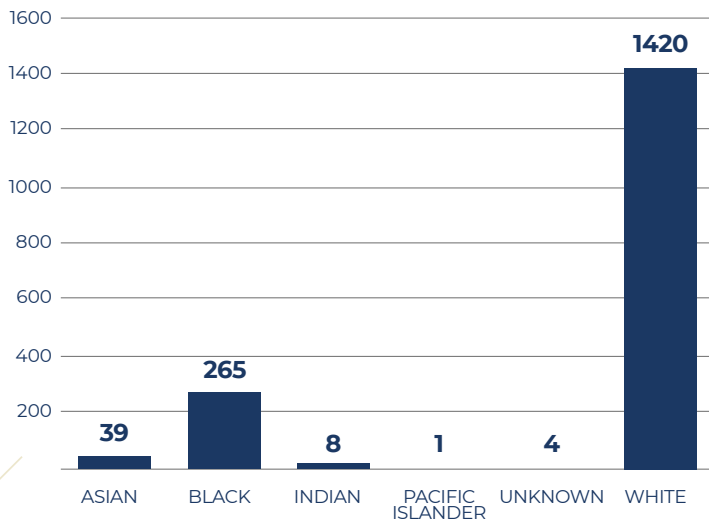

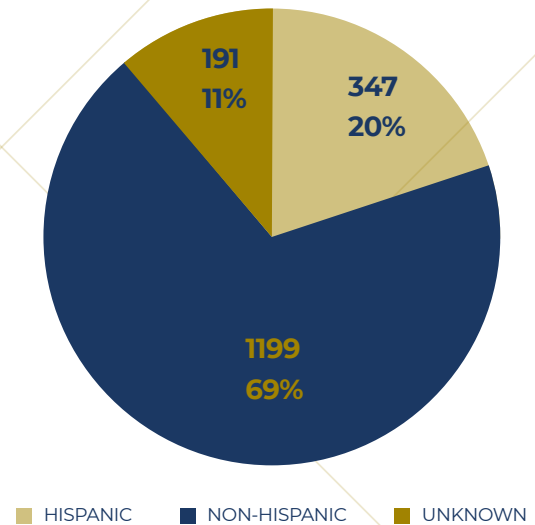
Arrest Demographics tracks the arrestee's race, ethnicity, sex, and age.

### TOTAL ADULT AND JUVENILE ARRESTS: 1737

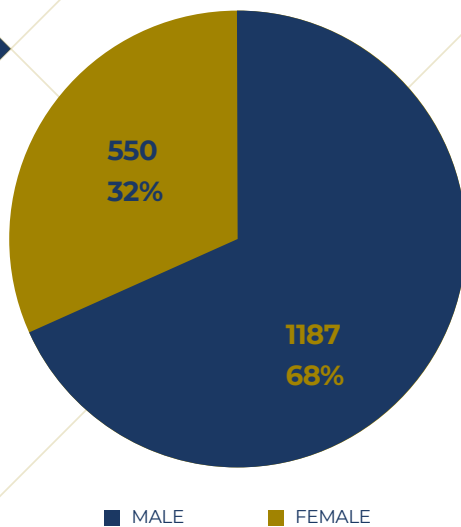
2022 Arrests by Race



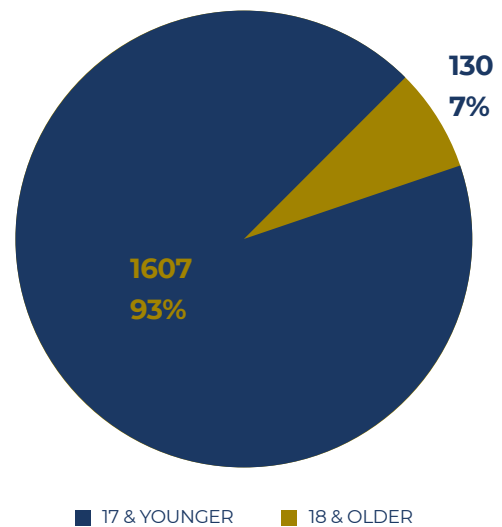
2022 Arrests by Ethnic Origin

2022 Arrests by Age

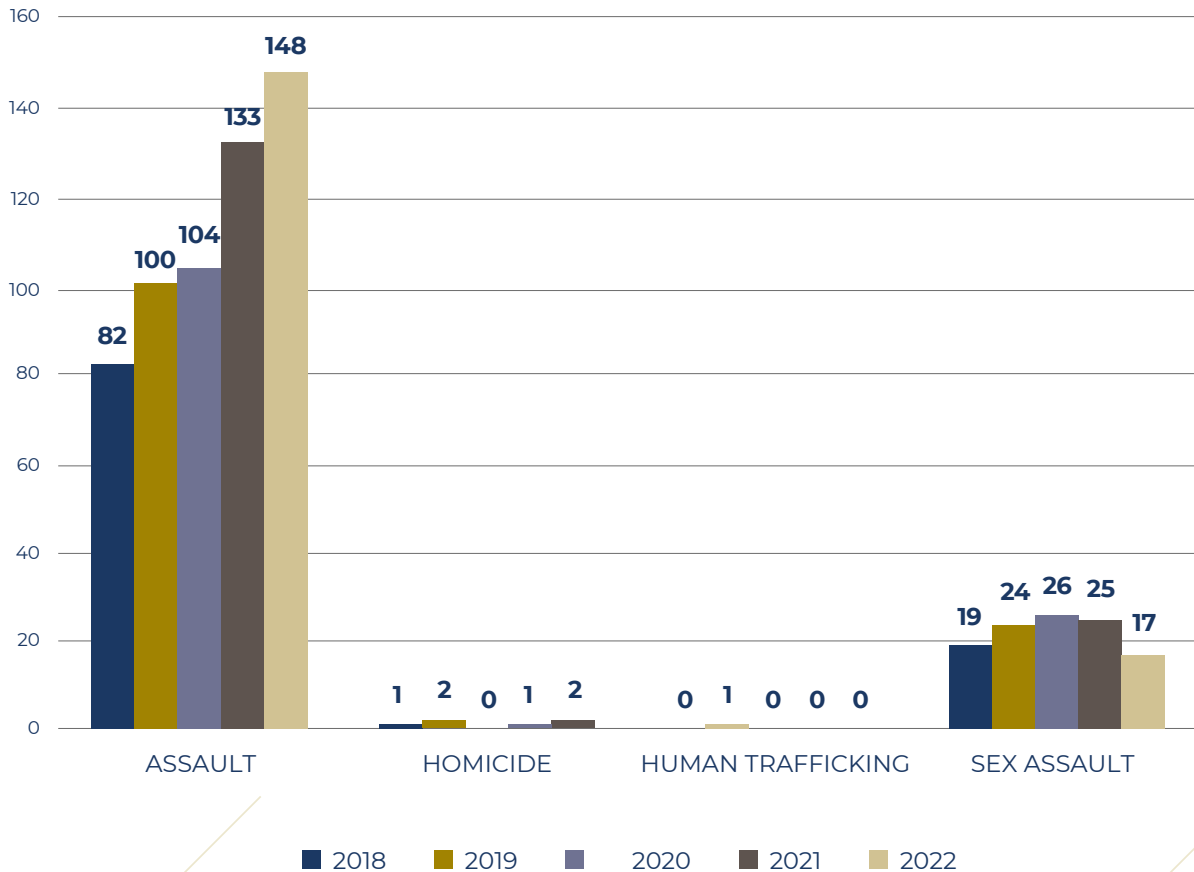

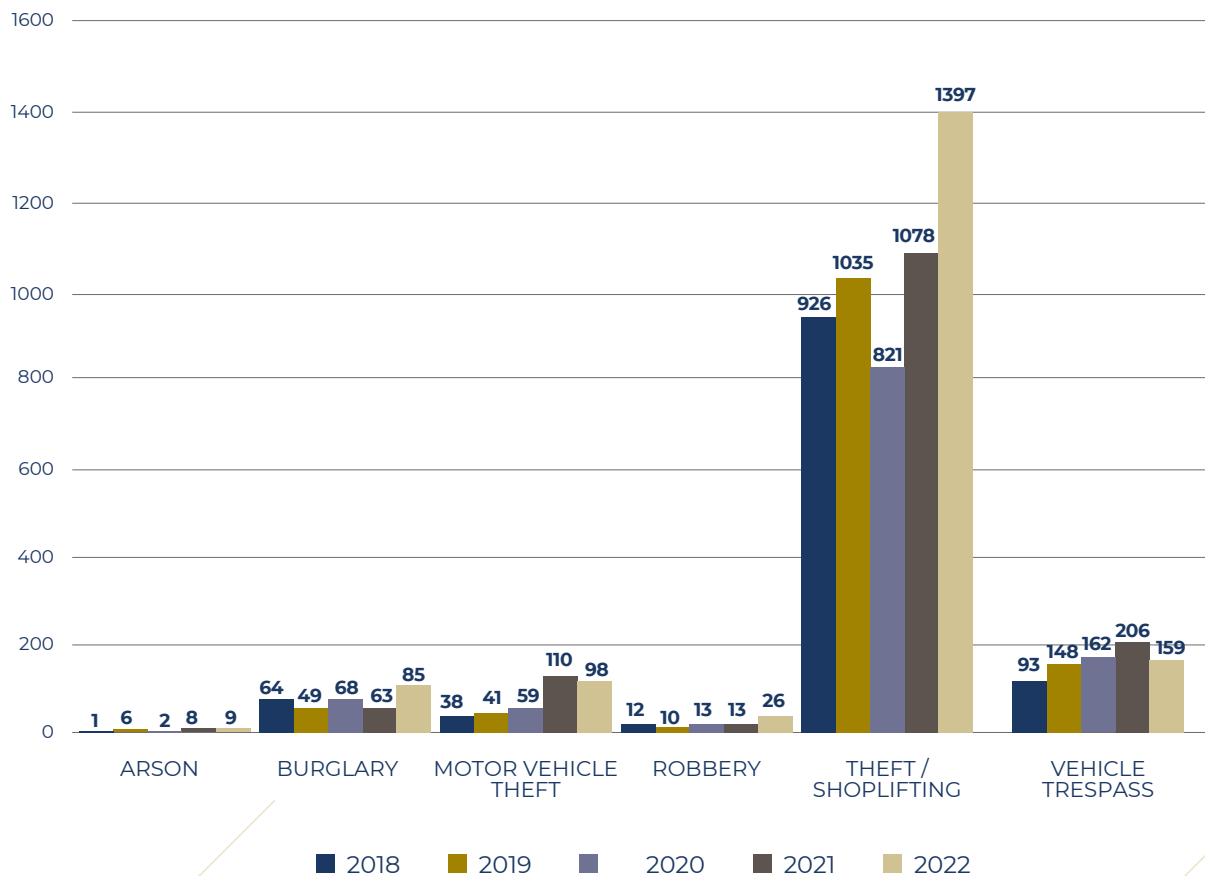
